Dr. Watson, having returned to London after serving in the Second Anglo-Afghan War, is forced to leave the armed services and is now looking for a place to live. He runs into an old friend named Stamford who mentions that an acquaintance of his, Sherlock Holmes, is looking for someone to split the rent at a flat at 221B Baker Street, but he cautions Watson about Holmes's eccentricities. Watson is amazed by Holmes, who has profound knowledge of chemistry and sensational literature, and very precise knowledge of geology, botany and many other disciplines. In 1887, Conan Doyle's first significant work, *A Study in Scarlet*, appeared in Beeton's Christmas Annual. It featured the first appearance of detective Sherlock Holmes, the protagonist who was to eventually make Conan Doyle's reputation. A prolific writer, Conan Doyle continued to produce a range of fictional works over the following years. Sir Arthur Ignatius Conan Doyle was born May 22, 1859, at 11 Picardy Place in Edinburgh, Scotland. [Note: While Doyle was his original surname and Arthur Ignatius Conan his given names, he apparently later used Conan with Doyle as a compound surname. Nevertheless, as the British Library and the Library of Congress both list him simply as "Doyle," and as that was how he was knighted, we will follow that convention.] He was born to artist Charles Altamont Doyle and the former Mary Foley, who had married four years earlier. Both were of Irish Catholic descent, but Charles was English by birth. Besides Arthur, they had eight other

children: seven girls and one other boy.
