The floriography craze was introduced to Europe by two people: Englishwoman Mary Wortley Montagu (1689-1762), who brought it to England in 1717, and Aubry de La Mottraye (1674-1743), who introduced it to the Swedish court in 1727.

Floriography is the term used to represent the language of flowers. It was coined

during the Victorian era (1837-1901) to define the symbolic meanings attributed to various flowers. Floriography or the language of flowers is the art of flower symbolism.

The scientific name of the carnation is *dianthus*, which derives from the Greek words "dios" (genitive of "Zeus") and "anthos" (meaning "flower"). They are therefore referred to as the "flower of Zeus." Each color of carnation carried different meanings to Victorians: Red carnations symbolized admiration.
